Learner Entry Requirements for this Qualification

There are no previous qualification or prior knowledge requirements for learners for this qualification. However learners must be able to participate in an active course that involves some kneeling, rolling, lying on the floor and touching of others, in both indoor and outdoor woodland environments.

Course structure

The course comprises two mandatory units: Forest School Emergency Action and Forest School incident management. Candidates must successfully complete both in order to gain the qualification.

Qualification Objectives

Forest School Emergency Action Objectives:

The learner will.....

1 Be able to assess an emergency situation in a forest school setting and prioritise what action to take.

2 Be able to provide first aid to an unresponsive casualty in a forest school setting.

3 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty who is choking.

4 Be able to provide first aid a casualty with external bleeding.

5 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty who is in shock.

Forest School Incident Management Objectives:

The learner will . . .

1 Be able to apply incident management and casualty assessment principles in a forest school setting.

2 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with suspected injuries. 3 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with an acute medical condition. 4 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with anaphylaxis.

5 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with burns or scalds. 6 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with issues affecting the eyes, ears or nose.

7 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with suspected poisoning.

8 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting who is experiencing the effects of extreme heat or cold.

9 Be able to provide first aid to a casualty in a forest school setting with minor injuries.
